What ACM Does

Originally, John began the programming manual for his own personal use. "I was tired of reinventing the wheel all the time when programming," said John. "So I gathered together a group of algorithms and developed them under Pascal." He then approached Russ, readily agreed, and so began their project that would last them nearly four months.

"I did the writing, editing, and initial programming, while Russ did the translating and debugging to ensure that each routine ran properly in every language," John said. The <u>Cookbook</u> contains some twenty variations on sorting and searching algorithms, translated into four languages: Pascal, C, Ada, and Modula-2.

The <u>Cookbook</u> already appears to be doing quite well. Favorable comments have been circulating around campus. We wish John and Russ continued success here at the University of Illinois and best of luck with possible national publication of <u>The Searching and Sorting</u> Cookbook.

In related ACM news, Jim Dobyns and Mike Bruno, also active members of the ACM Student

Chapter at UIUC, have started their own software applications/MIS company in Chicago. Mike was the founder and chairman of SIGMICRO, an ACM Special Interest Group for microcomputer users. And Jim was last semester's ACM executive chairman.

Now, we can't say that participation in the ACM was what created two authors and two entrepreneurs, but we won't say that it didn't either! Participation, active participation in the ACM has definitely had a positive effect on its members ... what about you?

\$20 Computer Fee Update

Computer labs are under development in the Illini Union and the Undergraduate Library.
